

## OAKRIDGE VILLAGE HALL



**Bookings:** The up to date Bookings Calendar for the Hall can now be found online on the Oakridge Community website at [www.oakridgevillage.org](http://www.oakridgevillage.org)

**AGM:** The AGM will be held on Monday 1st November at 7pm in the Annexe of the Village Hall – this is open to all villagers. This will include the usual round up of activities by the Chair and an assessment of present and potential future finances by the Treasurer. We also need to re-elect those Trustees whose 4 year tenure is officially up and the EMC officers. The AGM will be followed by a Trustee meeting.

**Community Restart Programme:** The Village Hall Trust has received significant financial support from the government during the pandemic. To help the local community recover from this difficult period and encourage hall use, hirers will be able to gain free hall usage for a period of six months from September 2021 to February 2022. This will result in some of the grants received by the hall being shared with the community.

How to Book Free Hall Use The hall may be booked for hire free of charge up to the value of £50 per month from September 1, 2021. Any usage over this value will be charged at normal rates.

Eligibility This offer is open to any non-profit organisation based in, or any individual living in, Oakridge Lynch, Far Oakridge, Waterlane, Tunley and Bournes Green.

## OAKRIDGE HISTORY GROUP



July saw the second and last meeting in a severely curtailed 20/21 programme. Following Jane Haines' talk on the history of Tetbury in June, we met her in July for a conducted walk round Tetbury where we saw for ourselves streets and buildings she had talked about. As well as pointing out some of the historic buildings, bridges, hidden courtyards and isolated graveyards around the town, Jane took us into the 17<sup>th</sup> century Market House and St Mary's Church for a closer look.

Our September meeting was the first of the new 2021/22 programme. Chas Townley talked about the start of the movement to build council houses to meet low-paid workers' need for decent accommodation to rent. The appointment of area Medical Officers of Health across the country in the later 19<sup>th</sup> century led to shocking reports uncovering the unsanitary, over-crowded accommodation endured by many families (for example 10 people sleeping in one room) which prejudiced health and, it was believed, morality. Although plans were drawn up for houses with sufficient space and adequate hygiene requirements, getting urban and rural councils to act when government monies were eventually made available seems to have been so slow a business that few houses were actually built before the First World War caused the

cancellation of all projects. Chas showed floor plans and pictures of houses in Mickleton, Gloucester, Dursley that did get constructed before WW1 postponed the building programme. Even so, there was nowhere near enough housing stock and some of the houses built cost so much to construct that problems arose in fixing rents which were higher than many families could afford. The problems with low housing stock, need and suitability of accommodation and demand at the start of the 20<sup>th</sup> century sadly rang too many echoes with today's situation.

At our next meeting on **October 27<sup>th</sup>** Steve Hill will be talking about the history of **Stratford Park and Mansion**. The speaker has had to postpone the advertised talk on Lillyhorn Roman villa, but on **24<sup>th</sup> November**, we will be examining some not so quiet village happenings - "**Riots, unrest and murder around Oakridge in 19<sup>th</sup> century!**" Do join us for these meetings.

## NATURE NOTES FROM WATERLANE



In spring I was watching a large bumblebee hovering over a hole in the bank of my lawn. It was a queen buff-tailed bumblebee looking for a nesting site, in this case that of an old bank vole site. They nest in large groups of up to 600 bees, often using old mammal nests.

They are the biggest of the bumblebees and are named after the buff-coloured tail of their queen, as the worker bees have almost white tails which makes them easy to mistake for white-tailed bumblebees. It is one of the most common UK bumblebees. After the queen has selected a site, fertilized queens construct a nest in which worker bees are produced later in summer after eggs hatch into larvae and then into a pupa.

They love all types of flowers, but especially like open daisy-like flowers where they can more easily reach the nectar with their short tongues. Mahonia is another favourite of theirs and I have seen them feeding on mine as late in the year as December. They are known as nectar robbers, if they come across a flower that is too deep for their tongue, they bite a hole at its base and suck out the nectar. Afterwards other insects looking for the nectar will also use the handy hole.

The queen I was observing disappeared into my lawn and never came out, so it must have found what it was looking for.

## **STRAWBERRY BANKS AND SURROUNDING AREA**

The Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust have a project at the moment called Communities for Insects - the aim is to improve pieces of land/limestone grassland from Dimmelsdale Reserve to Daneway Banks Reserve (the owners are the Communities) As part of this project a great deal of fencing is being renewed - currently taking place on Strawberry Banks and the fields above. This will mean that more carefully controlled grazing will be possible and the land will be improved for insect life - and by default increase flora and fauna in the areas




John is planning to run them for 5/6 weeks, 9.30 – 12.30 on Wednesday mornings, £40 for 5 sessions.

### **Further news**

The CEO of Stroud District Council Cllr Kathy o' Leary was present at our last Parish Council meeting. She was there to inform the PC of some matters that the SDC was involved with and in particular how they can help to resettle Afghan refugees, planning implications at local level and to generally make the communication with the Parish level of governance. The PC was pleased to welcome her and thanked her for her interest in it.

Far Oakridge mast – the update seems to be positive. It seems that EE (the telecoms company) decided to put in a “pre-app” for a site within Sapperton Parish (on the road between Sapperton and Frampton Mansell). It is away from houses and well camouflaged within woodland and there was only one objection (latterly withdrawn) so they now have permission to build the mast there to complement their Emergency Services Network.

Allotments – 2 issues were discussed in relation to PC owned allotments. Firstly, there is a need to raise the allotment rent slightly to pay for 3<sup>rd</sup> party liability insurance to cover the whole allotments. Secondly, the PC proposes to ban all insecticides and pesticides from its allotments.

Parish Council Office – at present the Parish Clerk works from home but there is a working group formed by the PC to look into alternative solutions to allow the Clerk to work away from home if needed. Any suggestions welcome.

## DISTRICT NEWS

**New Council Plan:** A new five year Plan, currently going through committees, aims to enact the goals of SDC's ambitious 2030 Carbon Neutral commitment for the District. The draft plan is here:

**Brimscombe Port:** Following a decision of the Strategy and Resources Committee, and plans to commence redevelopment, starting with demolition in October, the remaining tenants will leave the site by the end of September. Rush Skate Park closed on August 29th and the Grace Network has found a new site at nearby Brimscombe Mills. SDC have been providing support to both organisations, and for a new site for Rush, in partnership with Active Gloucestershire, Friends of Rush and the local MP:

**Sports Kit Donations:** As children go back to school, an appeal has been made for sports kit children have grown out of, as part of the BBC's 'Kit out the Nation' campaign, running until 2nd October. It aims to take in and distribute unwanted, good condition sports kit to deliver to children and teenagers who need it most. Kit can be dropped off at Stratford Park Leisure Centre.

### **Noise Abatement Notice:**

A Stroud resident was served with a Noise Abatement Notice to address the playing of amplified music at high volumes, which had regularly and unreasonably disturbed his neighbours. When the resident failed to comply, he was taken to court and fined £5,735, reduced on appeal to £1,000 with a £100 victim surcharge and a £500 contribution towards costs. **Climate & Ecological Emergency Bill:** Stroud District Council supports the Bill for a new law to protect the future of life on earth, one of 82 councils across the country to do so. The Bill is designed to reverse climate and ecological breakdown. It requires the UK to take responsibility for its share of greenhouse gas emissions, to actively restore biodiverse habitats, and to stop damaging our natural world through the production, transportation and disposal of the goods we consume. It has the support of 110 MPs across 8 political parties, representing England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. You can join the campaign as an individual:
