

Sales of the local history book, *Return to War, Bisley and Chalford Civil Parishes 1939-1945*, has raised over a thousand pounds towards the 2022 Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal.

Researched and written



over a three year period by four local authors and historians: Camilla Boon, Roger Carnt, Heather Collins and Peter Drover, the 420 page book profiles those who lost their lives during WW2 and is a companion volume to their 2016 publication, *A Parish at War 1914-1919*.

The book includes detailed biographies of the 35 servicemen who lost their lives, as well as chapters covering the defence of the Home Front, the experiences of local children and evacuees, women in uniform, the Land Army, POWs, rationing, everyday home life and the stories of some of those who served and returned home.

A cheque for £1,350 was presented to Ramesh Mootoo (Poppy Appeal Organiser) and Andrew Phillips (Bisley and District Royal British Legion).

**Grant Applications:** If you are a local organisation in need of funds, you may be eligible for a small grant from the Parish Council. The deadline for applications is 31 January 2023, with application forms and rules available from the Parish Centre or website.

We have an amazing group of volunteers running a **Warm Room** at Frith Youth Centre every Friday from 12 noon to 2pm. Join them for coffee or tea and a bowl of soup. A big thank you to those providing this much needed service during difficult times.

Our mini **Food Bank** is growing daily thanks to the generosity of residents and a large donation from Chalford Hill School. If you are feeling the pinch, please come to the Parish Centre and help yourself. In addition, **'Barry'**, our **Freezer of Love**, is stocked with nutritious meals by the Long Table.

If the above is not enough, Thomas Keble students are working with us again to provide small Christmas gifts to residents for a little treat at Christmas.

**Trees:** safety work will be carried out by our Arborculturist in Frith Wood in early January. This will entail the removal of dead wood overhanging or close to footpaths, broken branches and the cleaning up of multiple broken limbs and branch stubs damaged during contractor felling. There is also an ongoing problem with squirrel damage that leads to the regular dropping of branches. No trees will be felled.

**Chalford Band Track:** we are liaising with the band about the track leading to the band hut, and joining forces to make improvements. Congratulations to the band for taking trophies as the highest placed  $1^{st}$  Section Band and  $2^{nd}$  place overall in the recent Southwest Brass Band Association Competition.

**A reminder to Dog owners**: please pick up after pets and put poo bags in a bin. Thank you.

We have given permission for **ChalCAN Biodiversity** to plant three rowan trees and sow wildflower seed on land at the rear of Tesco loading bay. We look forward to seeing a beautiful display next year.

If you've walked the path from Coppice Hill to Dimmel's Dale you will have seen the dry stone walling work of the **Footpath Volunteers**. We have learned from our mistakes and are becoming increasingly confident in our skills thanks to expert dry stone waller Janet Gaskell's advice.



# **BISLEY-WITH-LYPIATT PARISH COUNCIL: December Update:**

**Neighbourhood Warden:** We were pleased to welcome our new Neighbourhood Warden, Mark Dodd, to our meeting on November 2<sup>nd</sup>. Mark, who is also warden for other local parishes, including Chalford, gave a short introductory talk on his role and responsibilities, which range from supporting vulnerable people to dealing with anti-social behaviour, abandoned vehicles, hate crime and bullying, as well as dog fouling and fly tipping. **Woodland at Fourways Junction:** As reported last month, the Parish Council was actively seeking to put in a bid for this land. At the meeting on 2<sup>nd</sup> November, the council reviewed its financial position and debated the issue: if the parish council owned the land, it might be beneficial in deciding its future use and preventing unwanted development. However, it was also recognised that we did not have sufficient funds readily available in order to submit a realistic bid. The financial rules state that we must keep a certain amount of money in reserve and this fact, together with the current uncertain financial situation, was causing concern to several council members. After a lengthy debate, a motion was proposed **'Not to submit a bid'** and this was carried by a majority. We were later advised by Chalford PC that they had also decided that they could not support any joint bid from the two councils.

However, the PC have decided to request that a Tree Preservation Order (TPO) be applied to this area and the appropriate paperwork has now been submitted. We await a decision from SDC.

**Next Meeting:** The next meeting will be held at **7.30pm on December 7**<sup>th</sup> **at Bisley Village Hall.** The Agenda will be posted on the Parish Notice Boards and website a few days in advance.

# PROPOSED CHANGES TO STROUD ELECTORAL CONSTITUENCY **BOUNDARY:**

What is being proposed?

Initially, it was proposed that, to bring the existing Stroud constituency's elec-torate of 84,573 within the permitted

electorate range (71,031-78,507), the four Stroud district wards of Hardwicke, Painswick and Upton, Bisley-with-Lypiatt and Chalford be placed in The Cotswolds constituency. However, this would mean Stroud constituency falling *below* the permitted electorate range, so it was also proposed that the wards of Kingswood and Wotton-under-Edge, currently in The Cotswolds constituency, move to the Stroud constituency.

A high level of opposition from Chalford residents In the Stroud constituency, but, currently, it is still proposed that Bisley-with-Lypiatt will move to The Cotswolds constituency, joining Cirencester, Andoversford, Bourton on the Water, Chipping Campden, Fairford, Lechlade, Moreton-in-Marsh, Northleach, Stow on the Wold and Tetbury.

Due to electorate numbers, it is likely that some Stroud district wards will have to move from the Stroud constituency, but, for a limited time, the proposals are still open to comments.

# **District Council Notes for December:**

Warm Welcome: The Lamb Inn, Eastcombe, is very kindly hosting social afternoons on Tuesdays and Thursdays 2-5pm, with home-made soup, coffee, tea, warmth and good company – all at no charge. Everyone is welcome. It's lovely! Huge thanks to landlady Sarah!

**Recycling**: In the last issue, I mentioned the need to keep plastic bags out of the recycling bins, as they cause problems at the recycling centre. There is also a problem with kitchen scraps and food waste being put into recycling bins. Please separate food waste and put it in the food waste caddy or compost it yourself – or better yet, try to use food up and not waste it. Save money and help reduce climate chaos. Some 8% of global carbon emissions are from food waste.

# Remember the 4 Rs: Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle!

Constituency Change: The Boundary Commission is proposing changes which would remove Eastcombe, and Oakridge and Bisley from Stroud Constituency and put them in a new North Cotswold Constituency. This will make no difference to Parish or District Councils — we will still be in Stroud District for local services including waste and recycling. Chalford and Bussage will reing waste and recycling. Chalford and Bussage will remain in Stroud Constituency. The Boundary Commission has opened another round of consultation on the proposed changes. I and the Parish Council have resubmitted our objections on the grounds that our area is historically, geographically, culturally and economically closely connected to Stroud, not Stow on the Wold or Chipping Campden. # **CHALCAN UPDATE:**

In 2023, ChalCAN are launching a monthly programme of small group 'How to' workshops on a Saturday, once a month.

Workshops will include a beginners guide to making compost, how to create a pond for wildlife and how to plant for bees and butterflies. In spring, there will also be the chance to join a dawn chorus walk with a local bird-lover to learn how to identify our glorious songbirds and, in autumn, for children to learn how to build mini-beast homes to help insects and small mammals survive the winter.

In the first workshop, **1.30-3.30pm on Saturday 3rd December**, Sam Usborne will show how to make Biochar. Biochar is an intense organic fertiliser/soil improver that holds carbon in the ground. It is made by burning wood and organic material in a pit in the ground. Please note that the session is outdoors and will involve fire and probably mud, so warm/waterproof clothes and stout footwear are recommended! There is no charge, but places are limited to 12. Tea/coffee and biscuits will be provided. # HILLTOP GARDENING CLUB HAPPENINGS...

On 1st November, Jim Bocock, highly respected resident of Chalford and former Chalford Hill Primary School headteacher, came to speak to us about Chalford Biodiversity Trail. He kindly stepped in as Grace O' Donovan was working away on a re-wilding project, identifying habitats.

With gusto, Jim illustrated the talk with animation and descriptions, providing plans of the trail to members and without a PowerPoint presentation!

The 10km biodiversity trail is the outcome of grants and member action. It takes you up and down steep hills amid various habitats, including those with very rare species, and along a length of the canal. It is a necklace of existing sites for wildlife with flora and new spaces identified and enhanced by changes in mowing regimes, while changes in light density in woodland open up the canopy for flowers: bee orchids, Broomrape, Rock Rose and other limestone species and grasses now grace the land. Time to get out your wild flower/mosses and lichens/grasses identification books! There is so much to relish away from noisy roads, even in winter, with accessible paths for you to join the trail at different points.

In 2019 ChalCAN, in collaboration with Chalford Parish Council, declared they would be carbon neutral by 2030. This enterprising group is aiming to halt climate change by local action, and they have different groups you may wish to join: Transport, Food and Waste, and Energy. Biodiversity is a sub-group who have been busy adopting sites for habitat enhancement throughout the parish. 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# CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS, PAST & PRESENT: ADVENT ...

Advent begins on the 4th Sunday before Christmas, and is actually the start of a new liturgical (church) calendar year. In 2022, the start of Advent was 27th November, so, by the time you read this, it is probably already underway!

The date when Advent was first observed is uncertain, although Bishop Perpetuus of Tours (461–490) established a fast before Christmas which began on November 11 (St. Martin's Day). During the 4th and 5th centuries in Spain and Gaul, Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new

Christians at the January feast of Epiphany, when Christians spent 40 days in penance, prayer, and fasting. Originally, there was little connection between Advent and Christmas, but by the 6th century, Roman Christians had tied Advent to the coming of Christ. However, it was not until the Middle Ages that Advent was explicitly linked to Christmas.

The word Advent comes from the Latin word *adventus*, meaning 'coming' or 'arrival'. The origins of Advent calendars lie in Germany in the 19th Century, when each day of Advent was marked by burning a candle or marking walls or doors with a line of chalk. In the early 1850s, the first

was marked by burning a candle or marking walls or doors with a line of chalk. In the early 1850s, the first handmade wooden advent calendar was created, then some 50 years later came the first printed calendars.

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Like Lent, Advent is traditionally a penitential season, with fasting in anticipation of the feasting to come. However, this is at odds with the nature of many Advent calendars today, which have evolved from having little doors concealing a picture or a bible verse to feeding us chocolate, cheese or even alcohol throughout December! In fact, for many people in 2022, the reflective nature of Advent has been completely shunted aside amid the hustle-bustle of shopping, baking, wrapping and partying that precedes Christmas.

In the Western Church, Advent is separated into two stages: December 3rd-16th and 17th-24th, to balance the two elements of remembrance and anticipation. The first two Sundays look forward to Christ's second coming, while the last two Sundays recall the events of Christ's first coming, at the first Christmas.

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
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During Advent, flowers are taken out of many churches, replaced by the 'hanging of the greens' when churches are decorated with evergreen foliage like holly and ivy, symbolizing life in the midst of winter and death. The circular shape of the advent wreath is symbolic of no beginning and no end, while Advent candles represent hope, peace, joy and love, with the centre and fifth advent candle representing the birth of Jesus as the light of the world.





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### **CAROL'S COOKERY CORNER:**

# HOME-MADE CRANBERRY SAUCE

A quick and easy recipe. You can double the recipe quantities and make early Christmas presents for friends, with Christmassy labels and a circular 'hat' of Christmassy paper to dress it up.

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

1 x 340g pack of fresh cranberries 200g caster sugar 45ml cherry brandy, port or sherry

75ml water

### **METHOD:**

1. Put all the ingredients into a saucepan, heat and let it bubble for about 10 minutes until the berries start to pop, stirring now and then with a wooden spoon. Be careful of spitting cranberries.

 When all the berries are popped, give a final quick stir to crush all the berries. Allow to cool a little.
 While still warm, put into sterilised jam jars and cover each with a circle of grease proof paper and a Christ-massy label. I got my labels from Lakeland. Screw the

lid on. It will set well as it is rich in pectin.

Enjoy on the day, or with cold turkey or ham on Boxing Day. The sauce will keep for 6 months in a cool place.

To sterilise the jam jars - wash and dry well then place on a baking tray and pop in a 180 degree oven for 5 minutes. Allow to cool.



# **VILLAGE HISTORIES: The Greenwood Family of Eastcombe...**

Born in 1897, Robert William Greenwood married Frances Ethel Thomas (born 1899) in 1922 in her home town of Monmouth. From 1936-7, Robert, known as William or Bill, and Frances, known as Ethel, kept the Lamb Inn, Eastcombe, with Bill also serving as a local councillor.

Village residents remember the letters above the Lamb's bar: 'YCWCYOPFTBTY', which stood for: 'Your curiosity will cost you one penny for the blind, thank you.' 'Pound' was sometimes substituted for penny to allow for inflation and 'bottle' for blind; villagers also remember a large whisky bottle for collecting coins.

William and Ethel had two sons: David born in 1926 and Maurice in 1934. David attended the Central School in Stroud (formerly known as The Stroud and District Craft School) but, sadly, his younger brother, Maurice died of TB in his early teens.

David married Joy in the 1940s, and, after unsuccessfully applying to manage the pub in Thrupp, the couple emigrated to Canada in 1951. It was several years before they came home for a visit, by which time they were living in Buffalo, USA, and David had been ordained to the Episcopal ministry. Their visits became more frequent and The Lamb was always the meeting place for family and friends.



After retiring in 1958, handing The Lamb's reins to new landlord Solly Saunders, the Greenwoods moved to 15 Bracelands, taking residence soon after its building in 1959. Bill died in 1967 and Ethel died in 1978. Following Ethel's death, David and Joy commissioned a stained glass window at St Augustine's Church, Eastcombe, dedicated to David's parents, which also remembered Maurice.

David Greenwood died on February 12th, 1989, aged 64. In later years he was priest in charge of the Ephaphatha Mission for the Deaf in Buffalo, having developed an interest in working with hearing-impaired people as a lay assistant. In 1981, he became executive assistant to Bishop Harold B. Robinson, and was made an honorary Canon in 1982. He was also a trustee of Canisius High School, a Catholic, private school for young men in Buffalo, run by the Society of Jesus.


When David died, Joy had a silver birch tree planted on Eastcombe Green in his memory and also donated a ciborium (a receptacle shaped like a cup, used to hold the Eucharist) to the Church of St Augustine, now passed to St Michael and All Angels, Bussage. After Joy's death, her sister, Pat Hearne, asked permission from the Parish Council to scatter her ashes around the tree planted for David on Eastcombe Green.
