Eastcombe Allotments: A short survey has been distributed to all allotment holders and interested parties to get views on how the deer problem on the allotments should be resolved. By the time you read this the date for returning the survey will have passed, so we would like to thank all the people who responded and assure them that their views will be taken into consideration when any decision on remedial action is taken.

Damage to the Wall at the Allotment Crossroads: I suspect many of you will have noticed the recent damage to the stone wall bounding the allotments adjacent to the crossroads caused by a vehicle collision. The Parish Council are undertaking repairs to the wall and it is hoped that we will be able to reclaim the costs from the car driver's insurance.

King Charles' Coronation: The Parish Council is actively and financially supporting the Eastcombe Village Group with its celebration of the coronation of King Charles ${\rm III}$. Hopefully this event will be well supported and prove to be as popular as last year's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations.

BUSSAGE VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE NEWS

Bussage Village Hall was gifted to the Parish in 1926, 'for the education and mental improvement, recreation and general benefit of the inhabitants.' Since then, it has been run by a small Management Committee, all volunteering time and energy to ensure the continued use of the hall as a community space.

At the end of last year, two long standing members of the committee stood down. Diana Rosenberg joined the Committee of the Hall back in 2001. The then Management Committee of the Hall had all resigned and the Parish Council was asked to call an emergency meeting. The outcome was a new Committee and Diana agreed to serve as Bookings Officer, later filling a vacant position of Trustee. In Diana's words, 'I thought that a Village Hall provided a needed facility for the well-being of the community and should be supported. My father was also the treasurer during the 60s and 70s.'

Simon Green for many years oversaw renovations and maintenance of the Hall, and joined as a trustee in 2007. He says: 'I felt it was important to keep the tradition of the village hall going. Particularly as I understand the hall was originally funded by a gift from local residents in the 1930's.'

The current Committee would like to thank both Diana and Simon for their many years of work and commitment to the running of the Hall. Last year, Chalford Parish Council became the holding trustee of the Hall and the Management Committee continues to work to ensure the future of the Hall.

EASTCOMBE PRIMARY SCHOOL: MAY UPDATE:

At Eastcombe Primary we are always looking for creative ways to deliver our curriculum. Here is a small flavour of our recent learning.



Owl class have been learning about the Mayans, with a visit to Cadbury's World where they had a great day reinforcing their knowledge and tasting chocolate! In English, the children studied 'Holes' by Louis Sachar, using the text to write creatively. In Science, the class learned about living things and habitats, conducting an experiment by taking cuttings from a geranium plant.

Hedgehog class had a virtual tour of a local Cheltenham synagogue for RE. They listened carefully and asked lots of interesting questions. Their History topic was Romans and they enjoyed a visit to the Roman Baths where they learnt lots and had a lovely day out. In ICT lessons, the children have been learning how to touch type, a skill they will use throughout life.





Squirrel class enjoyed their Geography topic, Island Adventures, studying aerial photographs and maps. The whole class created a 3D map of Eastcombe and Bussage - a fun and shared learning experience. In PSHE, the children listened to the story 'Incredible Me' and celebrated their own unique strengths and talents.

It's all change at the Parish Council - the Chair, Cllr Paul Lilly, is stepping down as Chair and Councillor at the beginning of May. We would like to thank Paul for his commitment and dedication to the residents of this parish during his 8 plus years of service.

Our Clerk/Responsible Financial Officer, Christine Prince, is retiring at the end of May after 21 years of service. A big thank you to Christine for the many years of assistance to residents and councillors. Kate Arnold will be replacing Christine as Clerk and Lesley Sellars as Deputy Clerk/RFO. We have yet to recruit an Assistant Clerk. If you are interested in applying, please forward a copy of your CV.

Stagecoach - District Cllr Tricia Watson has arranged a follow up meeting with both GCC and Stagecoach (date to be confirmed) to discuss the cuts to the 67 service and the need to look at more efficient bus routes within the Parish. Potholes - We continue to work with both our County Cllr Chloe Turner and Highways to ensure that repairs are carried out in many areas, such as Old Neighbourhood, High Street, The Frith, Dark Lane, Toadsmoor Road and Middle Hill. King Charles' Coronation - We will be holding a tea party on Thursday 4th May at The Parish Centre (Geralds Way) from midday until 3pm. Please pop along to have a slice of cake and a tea or coffee. We will also be replacing the seat that was stolen from the area outside Frithwood Surgery with a Coronation seat.

Silver Street Car Park - The Parish Council has taken on the ownership of this car park from Stroud District Council, and the area has been cleaned and the parking bays re-painted. We plan to hold a consultation with residents later this year to discuss a mutually agreed plan for the management of the car park.

Frithwood Surgery Health Walks will run every other week, starting at the surgery and ending at The Parish Centre for tea or coffee, and biscuits. A lovely way to get outside and meet new people.

Speeding – we receive numerous concerns regarding speeding in the Parish. If you would like to join our community speed watch group, please get in touch.

The Old Neighbourhood Inn – the current owners are finding it difficult to find someone to run the Inn and have put the pub back on the market. It needs some investment, but losing it would be a loss to the community. To form a working group to explore ideas to save the pub, please get in touch.

Footpaths — **accessibility and safety** - Parish Council Footpath Volunteers are working on the entrances to Bussage and France Lynch playing fields, improving access for those with disabilities, and improving safety - particularly for children. It will be a few months before we complete everything.

Committee were involved in the planning of the installation. Thanks to Rich Howe and Mathew Lupton of the PTA for making this happen.



DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S NOTES: MAY

Some of the ways in which Stroud District Council are working to make the district carbon-neutral by 2030:

Council home energy efficiency: SDC is using a Government grant of £1.7 $^{\circ}$ million to cut tenants' energy bills and carbon emissions, including insulation and window replacements, reducing annual bills by £200 and saving 200 tonnes of carbon emissions at the same time. The aim is that all council housing achieves EPC rating C by 2030.

Heat pumps will replace ageing boilers at Stratford Park Leisure Centre, the Museum in the Park, and The Pulse Leisure Centre in Dursley.

£500,000 will go to walking and cycling schemes. **Electric vehicle charging points will be installed** in SDC owned car parks.

Where possible, SDC will **replace retiring recycling and waste diesel vehicles** with electric. Where technology does not yet permit, Ubico will use palm-oil-free Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil fuel, to lower carbon emissions.

The new Strategic Lead Officer for Nature Recovery **& Biodiversity** will help to develop the Gloucestershire Local Nature Recovery Strategy and the Biodiversity Net Gain policy.

Following consultation, a new policy will encourage long-term phasing out of higher polluting **taxi and private hire vehicles** in the district. From 1st April 2025, renewal applications must be Euro 6 compliant (unless ultra-low emission vehicles remaining exempts) with wheelchair accessible vehicles remaining exempts. cessible vehicles remaining exempt.

Housing for Refugees: 15 homes currently housing refugees will eventually become part of SDC housing stock. A **Bicycle Mayor** will champion all things cycling in the

district, liaising with residents and industry, sharing best practice.

EVENT: Big Bike Ride: A family-friendly ride from the Bike Drop at Brimscombe Mills to Stroud Farmers Market takes place every 1st Saturday of the month, from 10am. As always, please do contact me about anything District Council-related:

BisCAN (Bisley, Eastcombe & Oakridge Climate Action Network) GARDENING FOR NATURE

Let's make our part of the Cotswolds a haven for wildlife! Even in a small garden, we can garden for nature, creating mini nature reserves and wildlife corridors for insects, birds, mammals and all the amazing microorganisms that live in our soil, plants and trees.

Here are some ideas:

- Don't use pesticides or slug pellets—poisons that kill not only the pests, but also many other organisms. The Parish Council has already banned pesticides (including herbicides) on land it owns and manages.
- **Use peat-free compost**: Peat is a major store of carbon and a vital habitat for innumerable living organisms. Make your own compost, get it from Bisley Community Compost Scheme, or buy only peat-free brands.
- Give your lawnmower a break: Mow a bit less and see daisies, dandelions, clover, cowslips and trefoils appear, bringing colour to the garden and providing nectar for visiting insects.
- Leave areas uncut and undisturbed: We humans like a well-cut lawn or field, but wildlife thrives in the untidy corners. Untidy is good!
- **Create a pond:** This will attract wildlife into your garden, including amphibians, dragonflies and all manner of other creatures, as well as providing a water source and bathing area for wild birds and mammals.
- Create a pile in a corner of the garden—logs or stones to create habitat for reptiles, insects and small mammals. Leave dead wood alone.

HILLTOP GARDENING CLUB HAPPENINGS...

A sunny evening brought a good number to the first talk of the spring season at Eastcombe Village Hall-'Allotments- soils and care', by Robert Bryant, warden for Eastcombe allotments, and Lesley Evans, nee Greene, warden of Bisley Chestergate allotments and stalwart of the Bisley Community Composting Scheme. Between them, they have vast experience - Robert designing gardens with flowers at their heart, for acid engineers growing and as an ambassador for soil enrichment.

Eastcombe has 56 plots, most in cultivation. Bisley allotment is an open space, with large plots surrounded by hedgerows and a community orchard at one end. There are currently plots available at both sites.

Robert began with photographs of his 'journey' at East-combe since 2018, before a discussion on pests and how to care for plots organically. Lesley spoke out for no-dig gardening (Charles Dowding), composting and avoiding rotavation, which breaks up couch grass and damages the texture of the soil. She explained that gardeners will not be able to use peat based compost from next year.

A pond encourages wildlife, whether a small bowl or a larger pond, introducing toads which remove slugs with-out any need for poisons! It's essential to ensure that animals, é.g. hedgehogs, can drink but be able to climb out. Both allotment sites have wild flower meadows - Robert transformed a dumping ground in one corner to a flowery meadow - buying seed wholesale allowed a greater area to be sown (perhaps plot holders can share?) Pernicious weeds need to be cleared first and seed must touch the soil for germination. Some Bisley allotment holders have wild flora on their plots, which encourages pollinators, who then aid fruiting. Plot holders swap plants and give excess fruit and vegetables to the Stroud Food Bank.

Next Meeting: 2nd May: 'Hilltop Team Gardening Tips': sowing, and planting a wild flower meadow.

Meetings are at Eastcombe Village Hall, 7.15pm (coffee), with talks starting at 7.45pm.

HEDGEHOG AWARENESS WEEK: 30TH APRIL-6TH MAY 2023

Hedgehog Awareness Week is run by the British Hedgehog Preservation Society and aims to highlight the problems hedgehogs face - and how we can help.

Why do we need Hedgehog Awareness Week?

Sadly, hedgehog population numbers are in decline, with numbers falling by up to 50% since 2000. This is partly due to shrinking habitats, but may also be due to the use of pesticides such as slug pellets and other environmental factors, such as climate change. Hedgehogs play an important role in maintaining biodiversity in our ecosystems, controlling pests like slugs and snails which can damage garden plants and crops.

How can we help hedgehogs?

- Create a hedgehog highway to allow hedgehogs in and out of your garden Cover drains and deep holes and ensure there's an easy route out of ponds. Check areas thoroughly before mowing or strimming.

- Build a hedgehog home. Avoid using pesticides and poisons.
- Pick up litter, so that wildlife does not get trapped or injured.
- Drive carefully, especially at night when hedgehogs are out & about

Hedgehog Facts:

- Hedgehogs are so-called because they root through hedges in search of small creatures to eat, making a grunting sound similar to that of a pig.

 Their eyesight isn't very good. Instead, they hunt use hearing and smell.

 Hedgehogs have over 5000 spikes.

 There are 15 species of hedgehog, but the UK only has one native species, the European Hedgehog.

- A group of hedgehogs is called an array, but it's rare to see them together.
- Hedgehogs can swim—and can even climb trees!

- 120g softened butter
- 120g caster sugar 150g self raising flour
- Pinch of baking powder (add to flour)
- 2 eggs
- 12 paper cup cases Red & blue colouring
- Cake decoration sprinkles: edible silver balls, strands etc

METHOD:

- Heat the oven to 170 degrees/
- gas mark 5 (fan 160 degrees). Cream together the butter and 2. caster sugar until light and
- fluffy. Add the beaten egg alternate-ly with the flour until all is 3. incorporated, then give a final beat.
- Place the paper cake cases in 4. a 12 hole patty tin and 3/4 fill them with mixture.
- Bake 20+ minutes until golden brown, firm and springy to the touch.
- Allow to cool.



LEMON ICING (lemon gives extra flavour)

INGREDIENTS:

- 200g icing sugar (approx)
- 1 tablespoon lemòn juice (approx)

- 1. Put the icing sugar into a bowl and add enough lemon juice to make a fairly thick paste.

 2. Divide into 3 portions. Colour one
- red, one blue and leave the 3rd.
- 3. Spread onto the cakes & decorate with sprinkles - enjoy using your creative talents!





A MAN OF EASTCOMBE: REMEMBERING BILL BEER ...

William Beer, known as Bill, was born in 1933, one of 10 children, in Cardiff, opposite Cardiff Arms Park, by the River Taff. His father, also William, was a blacksmith and worked at Cardiff Docks, while mother Florence came from Mountain Ash.

Money was tight, so Bill worked weekends on a greengrocer's stall. The greengrocer, Mr Crab, told him that he could eat an apple when minding the stall. One day, Mr Crab found a huge pile of apple cores - he didn't realise that, when you come from a large family, the chance of extra food was too good to miss.

In WWII, the family had a lucky escape when a parachute bomb floated past, destroying 30 houses nearby, killing many. Bill's father built bunks in the cellar as an air raid shelter. Three of Bill's brothers and one sister served in the war - his brother Stanley's ship was torpedoed on convoy duty and he was believed lost, but he turned up months later.

After leaving school, Bill worked as a telegram boy in Cardiff before joining the RAF, posted to Oxfordshire, then Aston Down. He worked on many different aircraft, including Lancaster bombers, Spitfires, the first jets and the Canberra. One day, one of the Canberra mechanics knocked a lever which dropped the whole aircraft undercarriage onto the ground - this accident saw new safety measures added to all Canberras.

Bill met Patricia Webb at a dance at Chalford, where she lived with her father, the village postman, and her mother, Annie, originally from Aberystwyth, at Westcot (now Barley Cottage) in Randall's Green. Bill would walk to Chalford from Aston Down via Gypsy Lane; one day, he heard heavy coughing as he walked - worried he was being followed, he was relieved when the coughing turned to mooing and he realised it was a cow!



Bill & Patricia married in 1954 at the Congregation Chapel, Chalford Hill, and were one of the first to move into Bracelands, Eastcombe, where Bill was to stay for over 60 years. In those days, Bracelands was a cul-de-sac; the sketch, left, is painted from the field (now covered by houses) between the tin church hall (destroyed by fire in 1962) and St Mary's. The new houses of Bracelands seemed very modern with inside toilets, bathrooms and coal boilers - Westcot, where Pat had grown up, had no inside toilet or bathroom and just a cold water tap. However, the garden was stony, so, every spring, Bill would take delivery of a mountain of manure, which he would spend days moving by wheelbarrow and spreading across the garden.

Each month Bill would use the red phone box below the Green to ring friends and family in Cardiff. In those days, Gerald Gardiner's coal yard lay where The Lamb Inn car park is now. Bill never forgot his Welsh roots and liked to sing *Calon Lan* in Welsh to his children. At weekends, he would walk to Higgins Garage (a hut then, now Fourways garage) and buy chocolate bars, which he would chop up so that they all got a bit each.

Pat was involved in village events and she and Bill had many friends, including Ernest Gaston, the McKees, Townsends, Shaylors, Youngs, Martins, Braggs, Pritchards, Holbrows, the Davis family and many more.

After leaving the RAF, Bill worked for Hawker Sidney, Rolls Royce and Bensons. He loved tinkering with motorcycles and was a familiar sight in the 1960s in his distinctive red and white striped helmet, always stopping to give villagers a lift if he saw them out walking. After retirement, Bill spent a lot of time in his garden, and was often to be seen at the dry stone wall chatting to friends and passers by.

Pat passed away in 2010 and Bill in 2023. Teresa, Paul and Debra would like thank all who came to Bill's funeral on 1st March, at Bisley.

VILLAGE HISTORIES: EASTCOMBE WI-90 YEARS of CAKE & COMRADESHIP!

Eastcombe WI celebrates its 90th birthday in May 2023. Founded in 1915 to revitalise rural communities and encourage women to get involved in food production during WWI, the WI's aims have broadened in the years since. It is now the largest voluntary women's organisation in the UK.

Eastcombe WI's first meeting took place in the church rooms in 1933, the year it was affiliated in its own right. Later, the WI hut, in Wells Road, Eastcombe, was built, with a very small kitchen and an outside loo. In the 1980s, Eastcombe WI moved to Eastcombe Village Hall and the hut was sold.

Every year, the WI held a garden party at The Triangle, in Dr Crouch's Road, opened by a local celebrity. Stalls included a plant and vegetable stall run by the Andrews and Perkins families. Joy Vizor organised races and Dr Crouch judged children's paintings, which were hung in the garage.

Members of the WI are busy people, helping with many village events and activities over the years, including delivering newsletters, Friday Club, Scouts and Guides, Open Gardens, Frithwood Community Café, Meals on Wheels and, of course, baking cakes for fetes and jubilees.

🖏 In the 1960s and 70s Eastcombe was known for its carnival, with each village organisation entering a float. The procession paraded around the village led by the Chalford Silver Band, ending with a fête on the playing field. Around this time, Eastcombe WI also had a very successful Drama Group, which performed in the village and at festivals in Cheltenham and Bristol, winning prizes, including £100 in 1981. An annual pantomime was also written and produced by a member and her husband, Margaret and James Kershaw, with 3 evening performances and one Saturday matinee at Manor School (nobel at Christmas Would sing outside the bourses of the

formed a choir, which, at Christmas, would sing outside the houses of the village - usually ending up at The Triangle, home of the Dr Crouches, to enjoy a Christmas drink.

Until recently, Eastcombe WI was part of the Bisley Group, which included Bisley, Bussage, Oakridge, Miserden, Brimscombe and Thrupp and France Lynch. Each took turns to organise the year's events, including the Summer Group Meeting, with a speaker, refreshments and entertainment. At the annual Carol Concert in early December, each WI sang a carol or read a Christmas poem, beginning the Christmas festivities.

Members have enjoyed many classes over the years, including flower arranging, photography, local history and car mechanics, with an annual bursary for one member to attend a course of their choice at the WI national college, Denman, now run online. Currently, members enjoy a monthly Craft and Scrabble Afternoon (4th Tuesday of the month) at the Scout/Guide HQ in Eastcombe, with tea and biscuits and a friendly chat, and we attend National and County meetings, as well as County walks and holidays. There is also an annual outing to Weston Super Mare.


